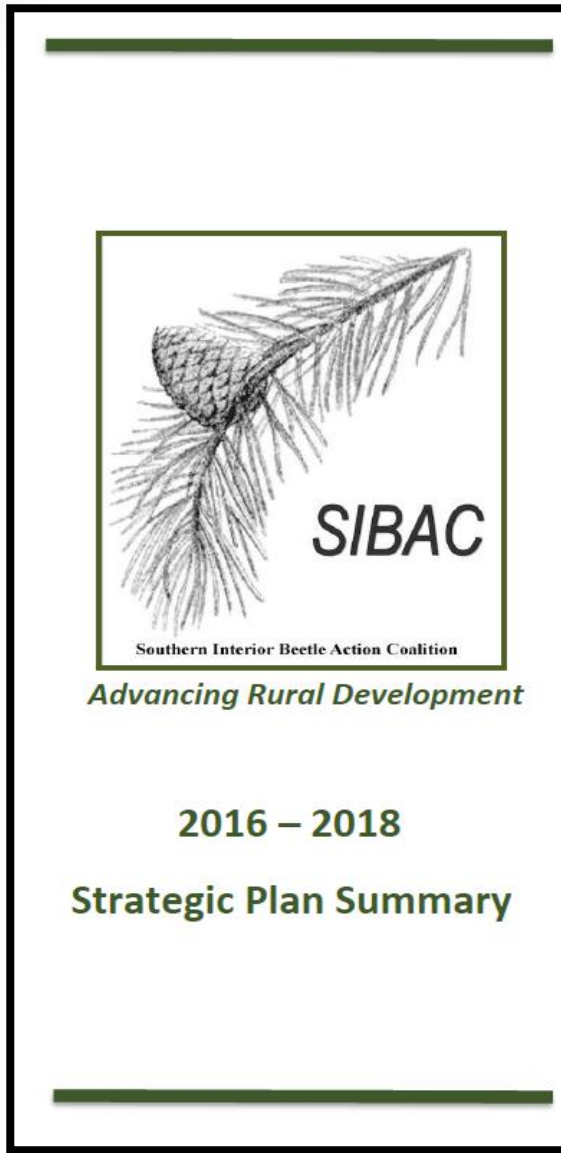

Mobilizing Local Capital

There is a need to increase the rates of business creation and expansion in many rural regions of the province. Lack of access to capital is often cited as a major barrier to rural business development. However, experience in other jurisdictions has clearly shown that when given an opportunity, rural residents want to invest in their communities.

Recognizing this need, SIBAC is undertaking two major initiatives. First, SIBAC is continuing to encourage the BC provincial government to create a BC equivalent of the extremely successful Nova Scotia CEDIF program. Second, SIBAC has committed resources to help create at least three rural investment cooperatives in the Southern Interior by the end of 2018.

Forestry

While forestry remains an important industry in British Columbia, its evolution, driven by a number of factors including technological change and industry consolidation has led to an overall drop in sector employment, and economic hardship in many rural BC communities traditionally highly dependent on forestry operations for tax revenues and employment. While there are no easy fixes, the emergence of [Community Forests](#) — locally owned and controlled forest tenures — may prove at least a partial solution for communities looking to stimulate economic activity and exert more control over their immediate environments.
